The moment arrives when the hidden King is revealed to His subjects. Most reject Him, but some accept. And in our lives we too have moments of testing when we are asked if we'll stay with Him in **suffering** or if we will not.

Jesus comes to Jericho, a town near Jerusalem and helps redeem someone who has spent his life abetting oppression. He arrives in Jerusalem, fulfilling prophecy by riding on a colt and being acclaimed by the crowds. He reclaims the temple space and teaches there to the consternation of His detractors. In the temple Jesus engages in verbal sparing with His opponents. He offers an alternative vision of God's purposes and Kingdom.

But the betrayal occurs and He is led to trial, crucifixion and death. All of His suffering tells us He **accompanies** us in our suffering: betrayal by a supposed friend, unjust arrest, abandonment and denial by friends, unjust court cases, unjust men in high places letting injustice be done, physical torture, all manner of physical pain, and identification as a criminal even when innocent. The lesson is that Jesus is with us, understands us, and bears all things for us. Perhaps more importantly, He is with anyone we know who is bearing unbearable suffering.

But then He teaches us that there is more to the story. He has **power** to change the story in astonishing ways. The resurrection is the surprising revelation that Christ is God, the powerful King, and simultaneously Someone who cares for us. As He astonishes, He shows us once again His extreme approachability. He walks with His disciples, He explains what has happened and its meaning in terms of the Scriptures, He eats with them, and He cooks breakfast for them. There is something so gentle and beautiful about a King who rules all, acting as a **Servant** to His friends.

But He is not only, and not merely, humble. As He ascends to heaven at the very end of the book, we once more see His glory, just as we did with the angels at His birth, at His Baptism, at the mount of transfiguration, and at the resurrection. He is the image of ultimate **glory** that all of our earthly images of the glorious seek to achieve.

Not only are we to obey Him as our King, we are to become like Him. We can learn to exercise power that comes from Him, and we can learn to be servants to those we care for and lead. We can learn to accept glory that He gives as He fulfills the promise to exalt the humble.






19:28-40 The King's Triumphal entry

And this became the time of his great sin, That he denied his Lord and did not die, So his heart was broken then within.


